



Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Inc. AoA Elders Program

The Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Inc. was incorporated as a non-profit organization under Nevada State Law on February 23, 1966. The Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Inc. is a tribal organization that was created by the 27 Tribes and Bands residing in the State of Nevada and the Great Basin Region. The Governing Body of Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Inc. consists of an Executive Board composed of Tribal Chairman from each of the Tribes and Bands. The main intent of the Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Inc. was to serve as a large political body for the small Nevada Tribes. From that point in time, Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Inc. has played a major role in promoting Health, Educational, Social, Economic and Job Opportunity Programs. The Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Inc. now manages Federal and State funded programs aimed at improving the health and well-being of tribal community members throughout the State of Nevada.

The Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada, Inc. AoA Elders Program administers Title VI Part A Nutrition Grants, Title VI Part C Caregivers Grants, Nutrition Services Incentive Grants and Medicare Improvement for Patients and Providers (MIPPA) Grants. The grants service nine Tribes and Bands whom are the Ft. McDermitt Paiute Shoshone Tribe,



The Confederated Tribes of Goshute, The Moapa Band of Paiutes, The Duckwater Shoshone Tribe, The Lovelock Paiute Tribe, The South Fork Band, The Battle Mountain Band, The Ely Shoshone Tribe and the Yomba Shoshone Tribe.

The Tribes and Bands of Nevada are all Sovereign Nations but, there is one common thread that we all share. Fall time is a very significant time of year for the Nevada Tribes. When the Rabbit Brush blooms a vibrant gold color it signals to the People that the pinenuts are ready to harvest.



Pinenuts which have been a staple to the diet of the People of the Great Basin is high in protein and is a very tasty treat. So, the Numu (Paiute for People), the Newe (Shoshone for People) or the T'anu (Washoe for People) share the common thread of Pinenuts from time immemorial.
